Cornelius Vanderbilt Professor, Department of Special Education

Erik Carter, Ph.D., is Cornelius Vanderbilt Professor of Special Education at Vanderbilt University. His research and teaching focuses on evidence-based strategies for supporting inclusion and valued roles in school, work, community, and congregational settings for children and adults with intellectual disability, autism, and multiple disabilities. He is especially passionate about equipping churches and schools to be communities of belonging for those with disabilities.

Prior to receiving his doctorate, Dr. Carter worked as a high school teacher and transition specialist. He has published more than 200 articles and chapters, and books in the areas of educational, transition, and community services for children and youth with disabilities. He has published widely in the areas of educational and transition services, including more than 200 articles/chapters and 6 books. His research and service has been recognized by the Council for Exceptional Children, the American Association for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, the Division on Career Development and Transition, the Division on Autism and Developmental Disabilities, and the Association of University Centers on Disabilities. He works closely with professionals, parents, and advocates to ensure the very best of what we know works penetrates everyday practice.
