

The session will highlight the differences between accommodations, modifications, and interventions, providing real-world examples for implementing these supports in Catholic schools. Through engaging activities and case studies, attendees will gain insight into selecting appropriate strategies based on individual student profiles. Emphasizing inclusion within faith-based education, the session aligns with the mission to create meaningful learning opportunities for all students, upholding their dignity and potential in diverse classrooms.

In this session, participants will be introduced to two essential Catholic school educational plans: Accommodation Plans and Individualized Catholic Education Plans (ICEPs). SPECIAL EDUCATION AND GENERAL EDUCATION: A FORCE TO BE RECKONED WITH

SUPPORTING THE EXECUTIVE FUNCTIONING OF SECONDARY STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES IN INCLUSIVE CLASSROOMS

Teaching executive functioning strategies to secondary students with disabilities is essential for their success in school and beyond. Executive functioning encompasses a set of cognitive processes that help students to navigate challenges, manage responsibilities, and accomplish their goals. In this session, participants will explore practical approaches to identify students' executive functioning strengths and areas for growth. Research-based executive functioning strategies will be presented and an approach for teaching them will be illustrated. Key focus areas that will be highlighted include planning, organization, time management, working memory, metacognition, sustained attention, and task initiation. This session will provide actionable strategies, real-world examples, and instructional techniques designed to empower educators to support their students in mastering these critical skills, fostering independence and longterm success.

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BREAKOUT 4 | PASEO ROOM UNIVERSAL DESIGN FOR LEARNING (UDL) BASICS Elizabeth O'Brien Walter, Ed.D.

Based in neuroscience, UDL is an approach to curriculum and instructional design that seeks to eliminate barriers to learning for all students. UDL presumes a diversity of learners in classrooms and all students are offered increased opportunities to access, participate, and progress in the general education curriculum. Curriculum designers use the UDL framework to structure and organize strategies for learner access, interpretation and processing, and application of content knowledge and skills. UDL also emphasizes additional aspects of learning, such as processing information and building deeper comprehension of content; utilizing executive functioning, organizational skills, and progress monitoring abilities; engaging in the learning environment; and defining self-assessment and self-reflection strategies.

Student disengagement is an increasing concern. More than half of students report they are "disengaged most of the time" and educators report higher levels of disengagement following the pandemic. More students are "unmotivated," "uninterested," and/or "non-compliant," leaving teachers with quite a dilemma. However, student engagement is a complex variable with a profound effect on student success and the classroom environment. This interactive keynote provides an overview of the contributing factors-both student and teacher directed. Many questions exist around Tier 2 interventions including: who is responsible for providing these interventions?; what do these interventions look like?; how are these implemented in an already jam packed daily schedule?; and how the heck am I supposed to gather data on this stuff? This session will explore the answers to these questions and provide ideas on how to efficiently and effectively implement Tier 2 interventions in educational environments.

PRESENTERS

CHRISTIE BONFIGLIO, PH.D

Dr. Christie Bonfiglio joined the faculty at the University of Notre Dame in 2014 as Director of the Office of Professional Standards and Graduate Studies for the Alliance for Catholic Education. With a background in school psychology and special education, Bonfiglio launched the Program for Inclusive Education (PIE) in 2016 and serves as PIE's director. PIE seeks to ensure students with different learning, social, emotional, behavioral, and executive functioning needs are integrated into Catholic schools. Bonfiglio teaches across multiple programs related to her work in inclusive education and provides professional development in this area across the country. Prior to her work at Notre Dame, Bonfiglio was the director of the Education Department at Goshen College following her work in public schools as a school psychologist. Bonfiglio's areas of expertise include behavioral and academic interventions through a Multi-Tiered System of Support. She is also well-versed in collaboration and child study teams. Bonfiglio has multiple publications on the effects of evidence-based reading interventions for at-risk students, as well as the impact of function-based behavioral interventions. She most recently served as co-editor and author of a special issue in the Journal of Catholic Education entitled "Inclusion in Catholic Schools." She is grateful to be directing her knowledge and skills to serve Catholic schools in their pursuit of inclusive education.



MICHAEL J. BOYLE, PH.D.

Michael J. Boyle, Ph.D. serves as the Executive Director of the Hermann Center for Innovative Catholic Education at the School of Education-Saint Louis University. Dr. Boyle brings a rich educational background, including roles as Superintendent of Catholic Schools, Director of the Andrew M. Greeley Center for Catholic Education at Loyola University Chicago, Catholic school principal, school psychologist and special education administrator. In 2014, Dr. Boyle was named the recipient of the C. Albert Koob Merit Award by the National Catholic Education Association for significant contributions to Catholic education. Loyola University Chicago selected Dr. Boyle as a distinguished alumnus of the School Psychology program (2022) and of the Administration/Supervision program (2017). Dr. Boyle has provided staff development programs and technical assistance to educational agencies both nationally and internationally in the areas of multi-tiered systems of support in Catholic schools, inclusion, and mission-driven leadership in the context of Catholic education.




MARK BRADFORD

Mark Bradford was appointed the Word on Fire Institute's Fellow for Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities at the beginning of 2023. For over 20 years, he has been blessed to serve in leadership positions in various church ministries, including as the executive vice president of The National Catholic Bioethics Center, and the founding president of the Jerome Lejeune Foundation in the U.S. Mark and his wife Denise are parents to Thomas, their 6th of 7 children (and first son), who happens to have been gifted with an extra 21st chromosome. Mark is a passionate advocate for those born with intellectual and developmental disabilities, for their families and for their full inclusion the Church and its ministries wherever possible. He is the author/editor of two books that will be published by Word on Fire in 2025, Let Us Pray, A Catholic Prayerbook for All Abilities, and Indispensable: A Catholic Guide to Welcoming Persons with Disabilities. He writes regularly for Word on Fire's Evangelization and Culture Online, and his work can also be seen at Aleteia and The American Conservative.

Mark is convinced that the solution to exclusion of persons with disabilities in society and the Church is through inclusion—and the younger, the better. In his role as the Word on Fire Institute's Fellow for Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, Mark has been charged with defending the lives of babies prenatally diagnosed with genetic disabilities, and broadly supporting the needs of persons with developmental disabilities in the Church.

A top priority has been to host various virtual events on the Word on Fire platform to inform Word on Fire Institute members about the possibilities of funding and providing inclusive education in Catholic schools. He has also convened a group of seasoned consultants and professionals working in Catholic "special education" at the primary, secondary, and postsecondary levels, and also those involved in private foundations, like FIRE, who are working together on various initiatives to encourage and broaden the opportunities for inclusion in Catholic schools.



MATT BRAUN, PH.D, L/CCC-SLP

Dr. Matt Braun is a Speech-Language Pathologist who owns and runs a private practice that provides speech and occupational therapy services across the Kansas City metro area. His team of 17 speech and occupational therapists provide in-home and community based services to individuals and families with a variety of needs. In addition to these services, his team works with a number of public and private schools to provide direct services as well as consultative services to support the needs of teachers and students. Dr. Braun has a cooperative partnership with the FIRE Foundation through which he and his team provide speech therapy services, occupational therapy services, and educational consulting services to ten FIRE partner schools in the Kansas City area. Dr. Braun and his wife, Sandy have three children, all of whom attend or have attended Catholic schools. Their passion for inclusive education stems not only from their professional work, but also from their personal experiences fostering inclusion in every environment for their youngest son Luke who was born with a medical condition that resulted in a number of special learning needs.



LINDA CROSTHWAIT, M.ED

Linda Crosthwait currently serves as the principal of St. Thomas More School, a vibrant Catholic community that places a strong emphasis on faith, academic excellence, and inclusion. Under her leadership, the school has embraced the mission of creating an environment where every child, regardless of ability, can thrive academically, socially, and spiritually. This dedication to inclusive education is reflected in St. Thomas More's commitment to implementing innovative teaching practices, fostering a culture of belonging, and supporting the diverse needs of its students. Linda Crosthwait views the school as a ministry, with the shared goal of guiding every member of the community closer to heaven through their daily interactions and efforts. With a certification in special education and 35 years of experience in Catholic and public education, Linda has been instrumental in advancing inclusive practices. With a deep understanding of evidence-based practices and a collaborative leadership style, Linda continues to guide St. Thomas More toward fulfilling its mission of serving all students with love, dignity, and purpose.

Mary Desmarais is an independent consultant who started her teaching career at a Catholic high school in Arlington, VA. There, her passion for inclusive education was ignited. Building upon this experience, she founded Catholic Inclusion, LLC, a consulting agency dedicated to helping Catholic schools include and educate students with high support needs and disabilities through various inclusion models, including the use of peer support arrangements that integrate students of all abilities. In addition to her consulting work, Mary offers teacher coaching and professional development, providing educators with tools, strategies, and the support they need to foster accessible classrooms. Mary earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Scranton, her Master of Education and Human Development from George Washington University and her Master of Administration and Supervision from Marymount University.



MICHAEL FAGGELLA-LUBY, PH.D

Michael Faggella-Luby, PhD, is a professor of special education and core faculty of the Alice Neeley Special Education Research and Service (ANSERS) Institute at Texas Christian University. He is also a past president of the Division for Learning Disabilities (DLD) of the Council for Exceptional Children and an associate editor for the Journal of Learning Disabilities. His primary research embeds cognitive learning strategies into subject-area courses to improve reading comprehension for all levels of learners. He has received two national awards for his research, has written 59 scholarly publications, and has presented 90 sessions at national or international conferences. His first book, Data Rules: Elevating Teaching with Objective Reflection is now available from ASCD.

Beth founded the National Catholic Board on Full Inclusion in 2014 and works to support schools - all schools - to be more inclusive. Beth has been an educator for over thirty years and worked for fifteen years for UC Davis in the School of Education with beginning teachers in their Multiple Subject Credential/Masters Program. In 2020, Beth became the Co-Director of the UC Davis Redwood SEED Scholars Program the first four-year, residential, inclusive college program in California. She works to build what she calls Continuums of Inclusion: communities that offer preschool through four-year college inclusion so that independent adulthood - inclusive living and inclusive employment - and full belonging are possible. With the launch of the UC Davis Redwood SEED Scholars Program, the City of Davis, California is now one!



KAREN GAFFNEY

Karen Gaffney is the President of the Karen Gaffney Foundation. Her non-profit, funded entirely by her speaking engagements, workshops, and donations, is dedicated to championing the journey to full inclusion in families, schools, the workplace, and the community for people with intellectual disabilities. In addition to her work at her non profit, Karen is a full time employee in a law firm, working 32 hours a week. She is an outspoken advocate for inclusion in the regular classroom for students of all abilities and she shares her experiences, tools and strategies that helped her succeed in her Parish classroom and in an all girl Catholic High School. Karen is also a role model for physical fitness, and she builds regular exercise into every aspect of her day. She usually starts the day with a two mile swim before she heads off to work! She has a lengthy swim resume to keep up! She successfully swam a relay across the English Channel, a 9 mile nonstop solo swim straight across the width of Lake Tahoe in 59-degree water and became the subject of the documentary: Crossing Tahoe: A Swimmer's Dream. She has done many other open water swims on the Columbia River, across Lake Champlain, the Boston Harbor, and the San Francisco Bay just to name a few. All of her swims are fundraising swims, and swims to raise awareness about what people with Down syndrome CAN do! Karen's work with advocacy and public speaking has taken her to audiences all over the world where she tries to show that Down syndrome is a life meant to be lived! And she succeeds!

FIRE began with six passionate families and one big dream: for all children, regardless of ability, to be able to learn together, with their peers, in their parish schools. Since then, FIRE has granted over \$8 million to Catholic schools in the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph. Funds are used to hire special educators and paraprofessionals, to provide professional development for educators, and to purchase learning technology and curriculum so students with disabilities and learning differences have the resources they need to succeed. FIRE is committed to opening doors and opening hearts to inclusive Catholic education and inspiring others to do the same. During the past two decades, we have learned that when schools foster a culture of acceptance and compassion, ALL students benefit. It's a special gift to watch students of all abilities grow together in knowledge, faith, and friendship.

FIRE's model of funding and advocacy has become a leading model for inclusive Catholic education. Since 2016, we have enthusiastically welcomed and partnered with 11 affiliates including FIRE Foundation of Northeast Iowa (Archdiocese of Dubuque), FIRE Foundation of New Hampshire (Diocese of Manchester), FIRE Foundation of Dallas, FIRE Foundation of Central Illinois (Diocese of Peoria), FIRE Foundation of Northwest Iowa (Diocese of Sioux City), FIRE Foundation of Denver (Archdiocese of Denver), FIRE Foundation of Milwaukee (Archdiocese of Milwaukee), FIRE Foundation of Northeast Florida (Diocese of St. Augustine), FIRE Foundation of Northern Kentucky (Diocese of Covington), FIRE Foundation of Wichita (Diocese of Wichita) and FIRE Foundation of Sacramento (Diocese of Sacramento). 
